Eastern Iowa REC celebrates 90th anniversary

Eastern Iowa REC is celebrating 90 years of business in 2025. To commemorate this milestone, we will share a fun fact, historic photo or bit of Cooperative history each month in the *Current News*.

As the Cooperative began to grow, it was decided area offices were needed so that line crews could be within a one-hour drive to any portion of the service territory.

Service centers in DeWitt and Wapello were opened in 1947. A third facility was opened in Lone Tree in 1949. Also in that year, the Cooperative's headquarters was moved from downtown Davenport to Wilton to be more centrally located within the service territory.

All four of these facilities have since been replaced with new buildings: Lone

Tree in 1996; DeWitt in 2009; Wilton in 2015; and Wapello in 2021.

West Burlington adopts a new franchise fee

Eastern Iowa REC members within the city limits of West Burlington will see a new franchise fee on their monthly energy bills starting in May. The West Burlington City Council adopted Ordinance 859 on January 22, 2025, implementing the franchise fee.

The fee will take effect with energy used in April. This will be a 3% fee on gross receipts from the sale of electricity to Cooperative members located within the corporate limits of West Burlington. The fee will affect approximately 40 Eastern Iowa REC members. While the fee is collected via Cooperative energy bills, the funds go to the City of West Burlington.

However, the Off-Peak Rate increases by 35%, so it's important to evaluate your energy habits before making the switch.

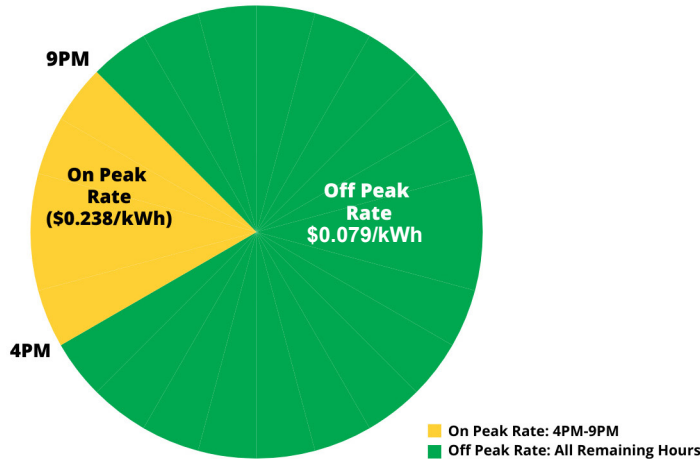
Who Can Benefit?

If at least 35% of your daily energy use occurs between 12 AM – 6 AM, you could save money by switching to the Super Off-Peak Rate.

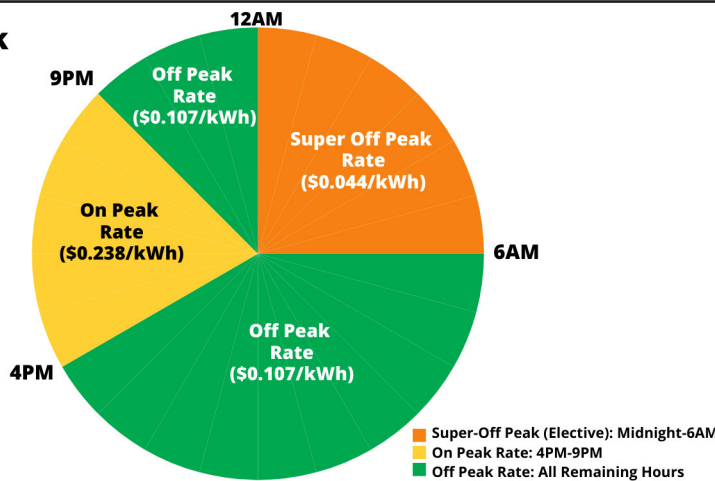
- Electric Vehicle (EV) Owners – If you charge your electric vehicle overnight (12 AM – 6 AM), this rate could significantly lower your costs.
