# Don't miss the 90th annual meeting

Eastern Iowa REC is celebrating it's 90th year in business in 2025 and will be hosting the annual meeting on Sept. 4 at the Mississippi Valley Fairgrounds in Davenport.

Registration and the craft exhibits will be in the Iowa Building across from the Fair Center Building to the north. Both will open at 11 a.m.

A desk lamp with wireless charger will be given to all memberships that register for the meeting.


The cooperative's live-line display will be set up in the exhibitors building. Demonstrations will be held at 11:15 a.m., 11:45 a.m. and 12:15 p.m.

Members will need to bring the bottom portion of the meeting notification letter that will be mailed this month. This will be used for the official registration, attendance count and the prize drawings.

A porkchop sandwich lunch for members will be served by Jeff's Market in the Fair Center building from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. One sandwich will be served with each meal. Two meal tickets will be provided for each membership that is registered. Additional meal tickets may be purchased--cash only.

The 2025 Eastern lowa REC annual meeting will once again be held at the Mississippi Valley Fairgrounds in Davenport on Thursday Sept. 4.

The business meeting portion of the day will include reports from board officers and Cooperative CEO Kirk Trede. Directors, elected at the district meetings, will be certified.

## Keep safety code in mind when making grain bin plans

On the farm safety is important. Maintaining proper clearance around electric lines is a key safety element. When moving or building a grain bin, plan for specific clearances required by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) and the State of Iowa.

Eastern Iowa REC and Central Iowa Power Cooperative can help create a safe environment for everyone working and living near grain handling equipment.

The diagrams printed with this article show the specific clearances required by the ANSI and the State of Iowa. If you have any questions concerning the drawings, please contact a Cooperative energy advisor.


Overhead power lines should be at least 18 feet above the tops of newly erected grain bins, according to the National Electric Safety Code. These clearances were established to allow for movement of large equipment in the area. The code also specifies distances power lines must be from the loading and non-loading sides of a bin.

The Cooperative may refuse electric service to any grain bin built near an existing electric line if the location does not provide the clearances required by ANSI C2-2017 "National Electric Safety Code," Rule 234f as adopted by the Iowa Utilities Board.

Electric cooperatives are required by the IUC to provide this annual notice to farmers, farm lenders, grain bin merchants and city and county zoning officials.

## The Cooperative is positioned to meet new challenges

As Eastern Iowa REC enters its ninth decade of service to the community, we can look back at 2024 and see that the Cooperative enjoyed another successful year and has once again fulfilled its commitment to providing safe, reliable and affordable service. This positive evaluation is based on the organization's financial performance in 2024 as measured against our self-imposed goals.

The Cooperative continues to meet its financial responsibilities and is positioned to maintain this positive financial stance as we move forward.

For 2024, operating revenues were \$64.4 million. This represents a slight decrease of .3% compared to the prior year. Kilowatt sales totaled 588,262,000 kWh in 2024 to 576,404,000 kWh in 2023, up 2.1%.

Total Cost of Electric Service was \$63.5 million in 2024, putting Operating Margins at \$882,000.

Combined with non-operating margins, interest income and capital credits of \$4.1 million, Total Margins for 2024 were \$4.9 million.

The Cooperative also returned \$2.6 million in patronage capital to members as general retirement authorized by the Board of Directors.

As member-owners, Eastern Iowa REC is your cooperative. At its best, a cooperative does not differentiate between itself and members – they are one and the same.

A cooperative functions most effectively with committed and informed leadership. Your board of directors is democratically elected from the membership to represent your interests and to provide long-term vision and direction. We hold true to our mission to be committed to providing safe, reliable and affordable offerings to our members to enhance their quality of life.

how it's produced and delivered to our homes. You might be surprised to learn that behind the scenes, a network of experts is working daily (and even by the minute) to anticipate how much electricity you need before you even use it.

We're all connected to the electric grid, so ensuring the right amount of electricity for all involves a complex process of forecasting energy demand, planning for capaci-

ty and securing enough supply to meet Americans' needs.

At Eastern Iowa REC, we work closely with Central Iowa Power Cooperative (CIPCO), our local wholesale power supplier, to secure enough electricity for our membership. This is done by using a diverse mix of energy sources to generate the power that is delivered to your home or business. By maintaining a diverse energy mix—CIPCO has options to ensure reliable power at a competitive cost.

To bolster CIPCO's "all of the above" energy strategy, they have announced plans to build a gas-fired generation facility in Scott County. This 240-MW simple-cycle combustion turbine peaking plant will be designed to run during high demand periods and as a backup to intermittent generation sources like wind and solar.

Construction is set to begin in 2027 with completion anticipated in 2029. The facility will be located on a 35-acre plot near Maysville.

Facilities like this are vital to ensuring the continued reliability and stability of our nation's electrical grid. Across the country, other electric utilities are managing the same task of balancing supply and demand, which is why we have a larger network of key players in place to ensure enough power is delivered across the grid.

As the energy sector undergoes rapid change, it's important for all of us to understand the basics of electricity supply and demand. Electricity use in the U.S. is expected to rise to record highs in the near future, with the demand for electricity expected to at least double by 2050. At the same time, energy policies are pushing the early retirement of always-available generation sources, which will undoubtedly compromise reliable electricity.

Because of this, an "all of the above" energy strategy that incorporates fossil fuel generation and renewables is needed. Eastern Iowa REC remains committed to providing safe, affordable, reliable energy to the members we serve. That's why we are preparing now for increased demand and other challenges that could compromise our local electric supply.

In the past year, our commitment to the Cooperative's core mission of providing safe, affordable, reliable electric service to the membership has never been stronger. Even as we navigate an increasingly complex and interconnected world, that is putting new challenges in front of us.

As the organization moves forward, your Cooperative will remain focused on the core mission that has been paramount over the past 90 years. We will always strive to deliver safe, and reliable energy solutions to the members of Eastern Iowa REC.

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
Much has changed over the past nine decades, but the Cooperative will continue to evolve and work to stay ahead of emerging threats while embracing the opportunities presented by new technologies.
