## Cooperative celebrates 90th anniversary

Eastern Iowa REC members again gathered at the Mississippi Valley Fairgrounds in Davenport on Sept. 4 for the Cooperative's annual meeting--this year celebrating the 90th anniversary of the organization.

The Cooperative's board of directors met following the Annual Meeting in a re-organizational session and elected the following officers: Ken Purdy, Columbus Jct., president; Kurt Olson, Grand Mound, vice president; Michael Bixler, Clarence, secretary; Henry Bentley, Durant, treasurer; and Brad Weiss, Burlington, assistant secretary.

Attendance was on par with last year with 775 memberships registered compared to 774 in 2024.

Jeff's Market prepared nearly 1,500 steak sandwich lunches for the event.

#### All incumbent directors re-elected to Board of Directors

All five incumbent directors were re-elected at the District Meetings held this summer.

Kurt Olson, Grand Mound, was re-elected to the board during the District 1 meeting held July 28 at the DeWitt Community Center.

Allan Duffe, Wilton, was re-elected to the board during the District 2 meeting held Aug. 4 at the Cedar County Fairgrounds in Tipton.

Henry Bentley, Durant, defeated Danny Foster, Blue Grass, and was re-elected to the board during the District 3 meeting held July 23 at the Durant Community Center.

Tom Hotz, Lone Tree, was re-elected to the board during the District 4 meeting held July 30 at the Lone Tree school cafeteria. Kathrine Wunderlich, Danville, was re-elected to the board at the District 5 meeting held Aug. 5 at the Mediapolis High School.

The locations for the District 4 and District 5 meetings were new this year.

Directors Olson, Duffe, Hotz and Wunderlich were re-elected without opposition.

All directors were elected to threeyear terms on the Cooperative's Board of Directors.

All of the directors elected at the District Meetings were certified and began their new terms at the Annual Meeting Sept. 4.

Overall attendance for the five district meetings increased from last year with 531 memberships registered compared to 471 in 2024.

Chairpersons for the meetings were: District 1, State Rep. Norlin Mommsen, DeWitt; District 2, State Rep. Bobby Kaufmann, Wilton; District 3, Dan Petersen, Muscatine; District 4, Larry Marek of Riverside; and District 5, State Rep. Taylor Collins of Mediapolis.

The 2025 Cooperative scholarship winners were introduced at each meeting.

Cooperative CEO Kirk Trede addressed the members at each meeting. His report touched on the Cooperative's financials, power generation capacity issues, CIPCO's power plant construction project and cybersecurity.
